

Message from our Executive Director



A lot has changed since the early days of AARCS, yet our passion and commitment to helping homeless animals is as strong as ever. In 2016 we celebrated our 10 year anniversary and looking back it was a jam-packed year of excitement, tragedy, struggles, and new beginnings. Nearing the end of the year we made a big announcement that would surely lead us to an even brighter future.

Like many, AARCS was ready to jump into action when our province experienced devastating wildfires in Fort McMurray and the evacuation of over 88,000 residents. While residents were running away from the danger, our Rescue Crews, on request from the municipality, headed towards "the beast." Our staff and volunteers spent two weeks on the ground and assisted in rescuing over 1,100 stranded pets. As a result of our efforts, AARCS was recognized by the Province of Alberta as a Hero of Wild Fires and by The Canadian Federation of Humane Societies with an Animal Welfare Leadership & Innovation Award.

With the wildfires behind us, it was back to business as usual, helping thousands of homeless animals onto a new life through our many community support programs. Averaging 500 animals in care and the calls for help increasing, our work continues. Behind the scenes we continued to plan and strategize our next steps and in November 2016 we made the decision to move to a new facility that would also house AARCS Animal Hospital. This monumental moment in our history is going to allow us to help more animals, by bringing this essential service in-house. The new facility will allow for continued growth for the organization for years to come.

As we celebrated this historical step towards a brighter future for homeless animals, we also celebrated AARCS 10-year Anniversary! This milestone was celebrated at our Diamond in the Ruff event, where we reminisced about the past, how far we have come and how much the future holds for us. AARCS has been and will continue to be a place where our community can come together to provide much-needed programs, allow Albertans to learn, volunteer and enhance their skills in a field that is meaningful to them and for people to support helping the homeless, abandoned and abused animals of Alberta.

There is no better feeling than to help a once homeless animal feel love and security for the first time. In this, I have found a deeper purpose for my life. I encourage everyone to be kind and be passionate. Do something every day to make our world a better place. Give generously of yourself, spread the word and spread kindness wherever you go.

The first year (2006) we rescued 52 dogs and were comprised of a handful of dedicated volunteers. Ten years later we are helping over 3000 animals each year with over 1000 volunteers!

Throughout the years, AARCS has been called upon to help in animal welfare situations across Alberta that have created headlines across the country. Nero, Tonka, the floods in 2013, a roll-over car accident involving 30 dogs in 2014, the infamous Milk River Dogs in 2015 and the Fort McMurray wildfires in 2016.

Although our focus has been on dogs and cats, there has been the odd horse, rabbit and tortoise rescue too!

[2016] Highlights

[FORT MCMURRAY WILDFIRES]

Battling smoky air and some not so happy cats AARCS staff and volunteers were on the ground helping to rescue over 1,100 animals stranded in Fort McMurray following the devastating wildfire.

We rescued cats, dogs, chickens, parrots, hedgehogs, rabbits, ferrets and every kind of snake you can imagine. It was an emotionally and physically draining time, but yet filled with so much hope. We cried happy tears as we watched the first load of animals leave on a truck headed to Edmonton to be reunited with their owners. We cried sad tears for animals we went to save only to find out that the home had been destroyed by the fire.

We are so proud to have been able to help the over 1,100 family pets find their way back to their families. We couldn't have done it without the support of everyone involved: From the volunteers and staff on the ground in Fort McMurray to the staff and volunteers back in Calgary assisting the displaced families and maintaining operations; from the foster homes who agreed to temporarily house evacuated pets to the public who came out to help.



[2016] Highlights

[INFLUX OF MEDICAL CASES]

In 2016 we managed 683 major medical cases. This includes animals in dire need of medical attention, including broken bones, gun shot wounds, quills, major infections, sarcoptic mange, and viruses such as parvo and distemper. We are so thankful to our partner veterinarians who assisted in managing, treating and providing outstanding medical care and surgeries for these animals. For all they had been through, we see a resilience you can only find in a rescued animal. For the first time in their lives, they felt the gentle hand of someone who cared. For the first time in their lives, they would get tofeel the warmth of a home, a soft dog bed and a big bowl of food.















[OUR NEW HOME]

After months of strategic planning, research and having received necessary licensing approval, we leased a new facility in SE Calgary with an expected move date of April 2017. This 13,000-square foot facility includes a 3,000-square foot veterinary hospital designed specifically to help the homeless pets of Alberta along with expanded kennel space for both dogs and cats, office space for staff and storage and training space.

Having a veterinary hospital on-site gives us the ability to help the animals in most dire need of medical attention with an onsite veterinary surgical suite and ability to provide life-saving treatment. Every day we receive calls about animals in medical distress that need help - from broken bones, gunshot wounds, embedded porcupine quills, and mange to deadly diseases such as parvovirus.

Forming the Alberta Animal Rescue Crew Society (AARCS) Veterinary Hospital will reduce our medical costs by approximately half a million dollars in the first year alone, with a potential savings of \$5,000,000 or more over ten years. With these savings in veterinary costs, we will be able to help more homeless and abandoned animals. This will allow more of your donated dollars to be applied directly to animal rescue and care.



[2016 HIGHLIGHTS]


- Through our partnerships with pet stores across Calgary, 208 number of cats found forever homes. This has allowed AARCS to increase capacity for cats, resulting in even more lives saved.
- Managed an outbreak of panluek originating from a cat brought in from a remote Alberta location, by closing intake and placing the shelter under full quarantine to ensure no spread of the virus.
- Ringworm was also a challenge in 2016 as numerous members of the public purchased kittens online only to find out they had ringworm. Although highly contagious, through rigorous quarantine and treatment protocols, we successfully treated and adopted out 21 of cats who had ringworm in 2016.
- July of 2016 we added a part-time staff person to assist our Cat Program Manager as we look to increase the number of cats we are able to rescue each year.



FINANCIAL REPORTS



INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of Alberta Animal Rescue Crew Society:

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Alberta Animal Rescue Crew Society, which comprise the statement of financial position as at December 31, 2016 and the statements of operations, changes in net assets and cash flows for the year then ended, and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our qualified audit opinion.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

The Society derives revenue from donations and fundraising, the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, our verification of this revenue was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the Society and we were not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to donations and fundraising revenue, excess of revenue over expenses, and net assets.

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Independent Auditor's Report to the Members of Alberta Animal Rescue Crew Society: (continued)

Qualified Opinion

In our opinion, except for the possible effects of the matters described in the basis for qualified opinion paragraph, these financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Alberta Animal Rescue Crew Society as at December 31, 2016 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Emphasis of Matter

Without modifying our opinion, we draw attention to Note 12 to these financial statements which indicates that the financial statements for the year ended December 31, 2015 have been restated from those on which we originally reported on July 20, 2016 and discusses more extensively the reason for the restatement.

Notes to Financial Statements
For the Year Ended December 31, 2016

1. Purpose of organization

The Alberta Animal Rescue Crew Society (the "Society") is a non-profit organization incorporated under the Societies Act of Alberta. The Society has a mission to improve the lives of animals by rescuing and providing sanctuary to abandoned, surrendered or abused animals, assisting communities to achieve healthy and respectful relationships with animals, promoting responsible and compassionate guardianship, and advocating on behalf of all animals.

The Society is a registered charity under Section 149 of the Income Tax Act, and is therefore, not subject to the payment of income tax.

2. Significant accounting policies

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations ("ASNPO") in Part III of the CPA Canada Handbook, and in management's opinion, have been properly prepared within the framework of the significant accounting policies summarized below:

Revenue recognition

The Society follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount can be reasonably estimated and ultimate collection is reasonably assured.

Service fees are recognized when services are rendered, and the amount can be reasonably estimated and the ultimate collection is reasonably assured.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash includes cash and cash equivalents. Cash equivalents are short-term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash, with original maturities of three months or less and that are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Property and equipment

Property and equipment is stated at cost. Property and equipment is amortized over its estimated useful life on a straight-line basis at the following rates:

Property and equipment acquired during the year but not placed into use are not amortized until they are placed into use.

2. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Goods and services tax

Goods and services tax is recoverable at 50% as a rebate. The unrecoverable portion is recorded as an expense with the rebate treated as a receivable.

Contributed goods and services

Contributed goods are recorded at their fair market value at the time of donation.

Volunteers contribute many hours per year to assist the Society in carrying out its services and fundraising activities. Due to the difficulty of determining the associated fair value, contributed services are not recognized in these financial statements

Financial instruments policy

The Society initially measures its financial instruments at fair value. It subsequently measures all of its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost.

The financial assets measured at cost include cash and cash equivalents, term deposits and accounts receivable. The financial liabilities measured at cost include accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

Measurement uncertainty

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period. Such estimates are periodically reviewed and any adjustments necessary are reported in earnings in the period in which they become known. Actual results could differ from these estimates.

7. Gifts in kind

During the year, the Society received \$100,962 (2015: \$68,816) of donated materials and supplies that were recorded as donation revenue and consumed in shelter and program delivery at fair market value. The Society also received \$Nil (2015: \$4,000) (Note 5) during the year in relation to a donated vehicle, recorded in property and equipment.

8. Commitments

During the year, the Society had two lease agreements for its office premises and animal shelter at the same location. In April 2017, the Society settled with the this Landlord for \$12,500 to terminate the lease on one of the lease agreements. The second lease agreement had expired September 2016 and was extended on a month to month until the move to the new premises could be completed. Both of the terminated leases were with a corporation owned by a member of the board of directors. The rental rates were at market rates for similar properties and were established in the normal course of business. During the year, the Society incurred \$67,800 (2015: \$67,200) of rent expense.

The lease on the new premises commenced January 1, 2017 which included a two month rent-free fixturing period and expires in February 2022. The Society maintained operations in its existing space while renovating the new space to suit its unique needs and completed the move of its entire operations to the new location as of April 30, 2017. The minimum lease payments over the next five years are as follows:

9. Contingent liability

In 2015, a dog placed in foster care by the Society was involved in an injury incident that resulted in fines being assessed by the City of Calgary against the Society and its Executive Director. The Society engaged legal counsel to provide a defence against the assessment. Had the defence been unsuccessful and the courts found in the City's favour, the maximum fines permitted by the bylaw under which the fines were assessed could have been \$60,000.

In January 2017, the legal matter was resolved and resulted in a total fine of \$600.

10. Financial instruments

The Society's financial instruments consist of cash and cash equivalents, term deposits, accounts receivable, accounts payable and accrued liabilities, all of which are carried at amortized cost. The carrying value of financial instruments approximate their fair value.

Credit risk

The Society is exposed to credit risk from its customers in relation to its Spay Neuter Assistance Program ("SNAP"). An allowance for doubtful accounts is established based on the credit risk of specific accounts.

10. Financial instruments (continued)

Interest rate risk

The Society is exposed to some market risk due to the nature of investments held. To mitigate market risks, the Board of Directors has implemented an investment policy that limits the nature of investments held.

Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the society is not exposed to significant other price risks arising from these financial instruments.

11. Comparative figures

Some of the comparative figures have been reclassified to conform to the current year's presentation.

12. Prior period restatement

During the year, the Society identified that a \$120,000 donation received in 2015 was intended by the donor to be restricted for specific purposes. As an externally restricted contribution, the amount should have been reported as a deferred contribution. The effect of correcting the error has resulted in the following changes to the December 31, 2015 financial information
